A Letter from the Dean...

This has been a very exciting year for the College of Business as we held a year-long celebration of our 100th anniversary. Our year focused on six words that our faculty, students and alumni felt best represented our College: Integrity, Discovery, Innovation, Community, Opportunity and Leadership. Throughout the year we held events, welcomed speakers and did community service—all to signify these six words. I would like to offer a personal congratulations to PGM alums Joe Assell and Rod Perry who were recognized as two of the 100 in 100 years. The 100 in 100 were nominated by faculty, alumni and friends of the college.

The PGM program was a big part of the centennial celebration, hosting a golf tournament in September. We had about 20 teams participate in the scramble—all of the teams had a PGM student as part of the foursome. Those who participated really enjoyed their time with our great students.



The centennial year culminated with a fundraising gala at *The Mill* featuring comedian Steve Harvey as our keynote speaker. The next day the College of Business sponsored the Alabama football game.

Last summer brought the beginning of construction of a 2000 square foot entrepreneurship center that opens in January. The center will house both the entrepreneurship program and the office of outreach and will be “home base” for our 94 student-run businesses. The build out of the center was made possible through generous gifts from our donors. The entrepreneurship center teamed up with Texas A&M in the summer to launch an accelerator program funded by a Blackstone grant.

Another big change for the college was the move of the university golf course under the college of business. This realignment of resources helps to better integrate the golf course into the curriculum.

It has indeed been a great year for the college. As always it is our alumni and friends that make MSU a great place to work. I look forward to the start of our next 100 years and the great things in store for the College of Business.

Q. When you think of your time at MSU, what comes to mind?

Be humble. Be authentic. Be patient with your career, and **don't chase a title.**

Continue building our operation at The Creek and mentoring current and future golf professionals. And getting the opportunity to ring my cowbell at more State football games.

Right here at The Creek in Locust Valley, New York, doing what I'm doing now.

Student Spotlight: Sally Morgan

Sally Morgan has gained experience on some of the biggest stages professional golf has to offer. Morgan is a junior in the Professional Golf Management (PGM) program at Mississippi State. In her first internship with the Professional Golfers' Association (PGA), she worked with the Tennessee section of the PGA. This past summer the Milton, GA native served as the Championships and Merchandising intern at PGA headquarters in Palm Beach Gardens, FL. Over the course of the internship, she worked both the Men's and Women's PGA Championships at Westchester Country Club in New York and Whistling Straits in Wisconsin.

Morgan sat down with Dividends to discuss her golf background, professional experiences and perspective on the PGM program at MSU.

Describe the background on your involvement with golf starting in high school and moving into the PGM program at MSU.

My dad has been playing golf for a while, so I have had a club in my hand since I was four. I started playing competitively when I was eight years old, and I began playing in tournaments all over the Southeast. I played competitively for about 10 or 11 years before I came here. I was on my high school team as well. In high school I got a lot of offers to play golf at schools, but in my mind I never saw myself playing on TV. I saw myself working in the industry. I still wanted to be involved in golf, but maybe not necessarily playing professionally. I wanted to be more on the corporate side of things.

Why did you choose to attend MSU?

I looked at 10 of the 19 universities that have the program. I guess I kind of just came on campus and it felt right. I just felt it—the whole atmosphere and the way the program was run. It was the second program to be established, so I knew it was well established.

What is unique about the PGM program at MSU?

The fact that it's in the business school is really key. That was one thing that I was looking for because other schools may have it in departments like Parks and Recreation or Hospitality. I wanted a business degree. I think having a business degree is very beneficial to have out of college especially for what I want to do, working corporately or in the industry somewhere.

Describe the process of getting the internship with the PGA.

Being close with [MSU PGA Golf Management Program Director] Jeff Adkerson and Adam Scott, our Assistant Director, is really key because they obviously have a lot of connections. The more you seem interested in what you want and where you want to be, the more willing they are to help you get those things.

What were your major roles in the internship at PGA headquarters? What were your day to day responsibilities?

This summer they had 11 different departments at headquarters, and each intern was in a specific department. They put me in the Championships and Merchandising department. I was in New York for a month, and I helped run the KPMG Women's PGA Championship. That was on the tournament operations side of things, so I helped run the Pro-Am, which involved dealing with the players, celebrities and other amateurs. When I was back at headquarters, I was helping people set up for the PGA Championship, which was at Whistling Straits in Wisconsin.

Straits in Wisconsin. That involved looking at and approving samples. Vendors worked with my supervisors a year to two years in advance just getting pieces of clothing together to approve the logo or color combination. It was cool because they would ask my opinions on things, so it was neat to be a part of that. People buy it, and you're like, 'Hey, I picked that out!' When I got to Wisconsin, it was a lot more labor intensive. I was actually building the whole entire merchandising tent and setting up fixtures. Then, I dealt with customer service as it got closer to the event.

What is the most interesting experience you had on the job?

One really cool thing in Wisconsin was when we had a creative designer come to help dress all the mannequins and do all of the aesthetics inside the store. My boss picked me to work specifically with him, so I helped set the store up visually. There is actually a lot of thought in setting up store layout because you are trying to gauge how consumers would look at everything. That is what is cool about the PGA; they are so driven on passion. They put a lot of research into the market and the consumers.

What are you plans moving forward, after the internship and graduation?

Last summer (2014), I worked with the Tennessee PGA section, so I helped run tournaments all over the state. That gave me some smaller scale tournament operations experience. This [past] summer I saw the bigger scale of it, as well as the merchandising aspect. I could see myself working at

headquarters, but still being able to travel and have hands-on experience.

Where do you see the PGM program going in the future?

[The College of Business] has tried to expand our PGM education. Mr. Adkerson is focused on getting you opportunities to see more of the business side. He created a leadership development team last spring to bring our classroom knowledge to another level, and to bring more of a business aspect to everything. He wanted to bring this team together as sort of a discussion team and to help us grow as leaders. Eight of us are on the team, and it's been really good. It was big for us because we could share our experiences in the profession and how we can grow through them.

How has the faculty at MSU helped you in specific ways that will be beneficial in your career in golf?

I have grown really close with them. They are always willing to help you whether it's related to PGM or not. Internships are a really big part of it because they want their students to get whatever opportunities they want. Because I want to do big things, I know that those things are not going to happen without Mr. Adkerson and Mr. Scott helping me get there.

How have the College of Business and the PGM program helped you develop as a professional?

Getting into a new environment in college, coming from out of state, was really good for me because it improved my social skills that could be transferred to the workplace. The College of Business is also very hands-on, which especially helped for the internships. Having experiences here helped me develop communication and other skills you need in these jobs or internships. Without the College of Business, I would not have the opportunities that I have been given or done what I have done.

99th Annual PGA Meeting Leadership Session

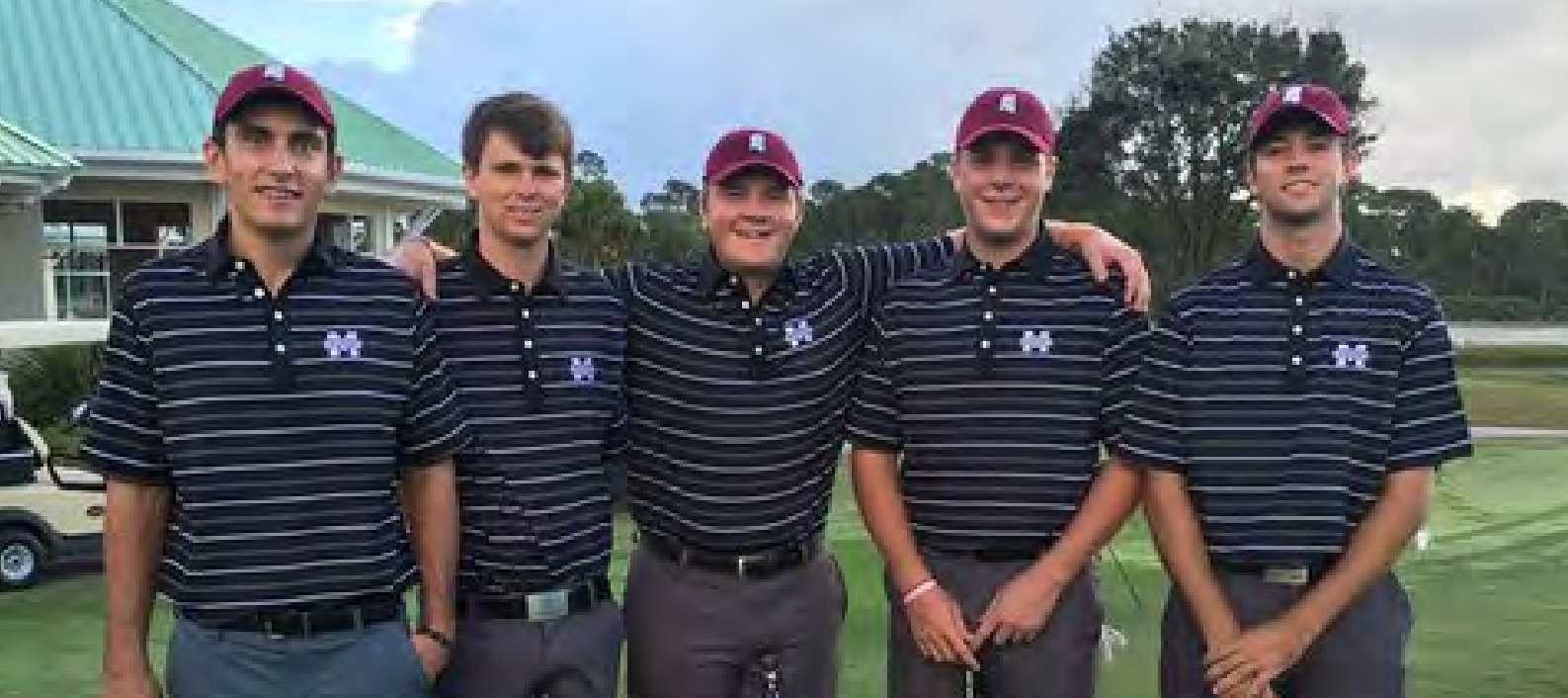

NMSU Wins 14th PGA Jones Cup

PORT ST. LUCIE, Fla. – The Aggies won the 14th Jones Cup on Wednesday at PGA Golf Club, despite playing with a greater purpose in mind.

The Aggies captured their PGA Golf Management Program's second Jones Cup, first since 2006, by nine strokes over defending champion Campbell University (584) of Buies Creek, North Carolina. 2013 Champion Ferris State University (590) of Big Rapids, Michigan and Clemson (594), finished third and fourth, respectively.

The Aggies won with gross score of 1-under-par 575, despite having played a man down since June. That was when Gage Gavin, the son of New Mexico State's Golf Management Director, Pat Gavin, passed away unexpectedly at the age of 18.

"This victory today meant a lot for our program, especially with Pat and his family going through such a tough year," said Josh Salmon, the Aggies' PGA Golf Management Program Specialist, who stepped in for his boss due to a scheduling conflict. "A few weeks ago

our guys dedicated this Jones Cup to Gage and the entire Gavin family. We really wanted to bring a little bit of sunshine in what has been a dark year for all of us," he added. "Pat talked to the kids last night. He's with us. To win this means the world to the kids. They delivered for Pat and the program."

The PGA Jones Cup is named for the first PGA Golf Management University Program Director at Mississippi State, Dr. S. Roland Jones, who held the position from 1985 until his passing in 1997. The event provides a platform where participants can display professionalism, integrity, character and camaraderie; all characteristics Dr. Jones instilled in PGA Golf Management students.

All participating universities in the PGA Jones Cup are schools accredited by the PGA of America to offer the PGA Golf Management University Program for aspiring PGA Professionals. There are currently 2,284 students enrolled in the program nationwide.

MSU Takes Heritage Cup 6th Straight Year

HUNTSVILLE, TX – It was a long, wet weekend, but the Bulldogs were able to hold off a furious rally from the Bearkats in Singles matches, retaining the Heritage Cup by a final score of 11-11. This was the first time in the history of the event the Matches were halved.

MSU lead strong out of the gate, taking the Four Ball session by a score of 3.5 - 2.5. Captains Jeff Adkerson and Adam Scott decided not to tinker with the chemistry in the lineup, and rolled out the same six pairings for the Foursomes matches. That decision paid off, as MSU rolled to a 4.5 - 1.5 session win, carrying an 8 - 4 lead into the Sunday Singles matches, despite a lengthy rain delay on Saturday.

The pairing of junior Andrew Argotsinger and sophomore Luke Millhouse showed some serious resilience by winning their afternoon match by a score of 7 & 5, after losing their morning session by a score of 5 & 3. The importance of their turnaround could not be understated, as every point

would carry significant impact.

Knowing the tall task that faced them, the Bearkats summoned a near-"Miracle at Medinah" comeback in the Singles matches. Captains Rich Ballinger and Brad Myers sent out their veteran leaders early, in the hopes of inspiring the rally.

That strategy started to pay dividends, as SHSU won four of the first five matches out, including victories over then-undefeated MSU students Cory Berg, Shelby Tucci, and Carson Willis.

MSU fought back with a win by Argotsinger, before a gritty performance by sophomore Sally Morgan clinched the point to retain possession of the Heritage Cup for the Bulldogs for the 6th consecutive year by way of 3 & 2 victory.

The Bulldogs were a young team this year, as only two players had previous Heritage Cup experience. This bodes well for the 2016 edition, being hosted at the MSU Golf Course in Starkville.

'Dawgs beat 'Pack in Dak's Final Game

CHARLOTTE — Dan Mullen noticed “it” during Dak Prescott’s performance in the 2010 Big Dawg Camp, an annual summer gathering of Mississippi State’s top football recruits.

“You could kind of see he was separating himself from all these elite players,” Mullen said. “Not in performance but in how he carried himself and how he led all these other guys that he had that ‘it’ factor.”

Through five years in Starkville, Prescott captured 38 school records, was a two-time All-SEC quarterback and won back-to-back Conerly Trophies (the first to do so). He guided the program to its first-ever No. 1 ranking, snapped a 14-game losing streak against LSU, and brought Mississippi State to its first Orange Bowl appearance in more than 70 years.

He accomplished it all with more than statistics. Prescott possessed a larger-than-life aura within Davis Wade Stadium, on campus and throughout the Starkville community.

MSU began playing football in 1895. One-hundred-and-sixteen seasons later, Dak Prescott stands alone atop the pantheon of Bulldog legends. Those who bleed maroon and white believe no one will ever join him.

“You go back in the history and you look at all the quarterbacks and the guys that have played, you would have to put Dak Prescott No. 1,” Coach Jackie Sherrill said. “Not only because of his play, but also because of his character and everything he’s done for Mississippi State off the field.”

Numbers and individual awards only reveal half of Prescott’s legacy. The quarterback unlocked expectations for Mississippi State that are normally reserved for the Alabamas and LSUs of college football.

“If there’s one person besides the head coach who has done more to change Mississippi



Five years ago, Prescott committed to Mississippi State, a school with two bowl trips since the turn of the century. Now, with five bowl trips in five years, winning four of them, Prescott can reminisce about his time at Mississippi State.

“I envisioned being great,” Prescott said. “Playing for a great team, even bigger things than we were capable of doing here. For it all to be actually real, for it all to become real, it’s so special.”

The Bulldogs beat the NC State Wolfpack 51-28 in the rain-soaked Bank of America Stadium on December 30th to claim the 2015 Belk Bowl. The win contributed to a strong postseason performance from the entire Southeastern Conference, as the ten teams playing combined for an 8-2 record.

Dak Prescott shined in his final game, as he completed 25/42 passes for 380 yards (a Belk Bowl record), 4 touchdowns and 1 INT. He added 47 yards on the ground on 12 carries. Dak was honored as the game’s MVP, and joined Colin Kaepernick, Tim Tebow, and Dan LeFevour as the only players in FBS history to throw for 9,000 yards and run for 2,500 in their career.

Two touchdowns went to Brandon Holloway, one to Fred Ross, and one to De’Runnya Wilson. Wilson declared that he will enter the NFL Draft alongside his quarterback.



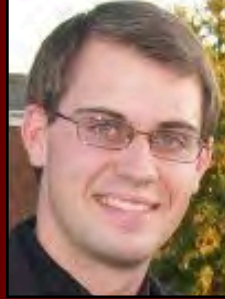
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
